



We were incredibly honoured to host the award-

winning author Andrew Crowe and special guest speaker Anihera Zhou Black in Colville this April. Andrew's "Pathway of the Birds" is an exceptional book, highlighting the deliberate and skilled nature of Māori and Polynesian exploration, navigation and settlement. His talk discussed how the book came to fruition, as well as some of the fascinating finds of his research.

Around 50 people packed the Colville War Memorial Hall, and the feedback from all was overwhelmingly positive. We were left in awe of the skills of these early navigators who were so in tune with the environment around them. It became clear that the navigation and population of



Polynesia was no small feat and was completed by highly-skilled masters, particularly considering the huge expanse of ocean, wild weather and just how exploratory these voyages were. The research that Andrew undertook was so extensive; his pukapuka is a taonga for those interested in traditional wayfaring, ecological connectivity and the history of populating Polynesia and the Pacific.

Following Andrew's korero, Anihera shared her experience aboard one of two waka hourua (double-hulled sailing canoes) that were retracing a historic 5000-nautical mile voyage across the Pacific using only traditional navigation techniques. The 22-metre waka left in 2012 on an epic 10-month, 10,000 nautical mile journey from New Zealand to Rapa Nui, Tahiti and Rarotonga. Anihera captivated the audience as she spoke of her incredible voyage, including the highlights and challenges they faced (see cover for a photo of Anihera's talk).

To have a talk of this calibre in Colville was a great honour, and our project was so proud to support it happening. A huge thank you to Andrew and Anihera, and all that made the journey (excuse the pun) to be part of this incredible evening. Coromandel Rural North Kerbside Collections, 12th May:

The Council has confirmed alternative arrangement for kerbside collections.

Rubbish and recycling collections in Northern Coromandel will be serviced on different days by Coastal Bins Limited.

- Rubbish (blue bags): Weekly collection on Monday's, starting Monday 15th May
- Recycling wheelie bins: Fortnightly collection on Friday's – from Friday 19th May and fortnightly thereafter
- Glass crates: Fortnightly collection on a Friday - from Friday 26th May and fortnightly thereafter

Please Note:

- These changes are for the entire Coromandel Rural North area, including Port Charles and Waitete Bay.
- For safety reasons our contractor's staff will only collect recyclable glass presented in a Council approved crate. If you need to purchase a crate/have a broken crate requiring replacement, please visit one of our Council offices.
- Coastal Bins collection trucks will go in the direction of Kennedy Bay to Port Charles, then Colville. We need all customers to place their rubbish and/or recycling kerbside by 7.30am on what will be the left side of the road for the trucks as they drive that route. Thanks.

Reminder – Flu Vaccine Clinics are Wednesday's in June 12.30 – 1.30. Please call us to book in.

During May, we have had 2 visiting locums – Paul Dillon; intensive care paramedic (ICP) and Vic Ralph; extended care paramedic ECP. Vic Ralph has been a paramedic for 15 years and an ECP for the past 2. Vic has worked on mountain rescue in the UK and in rural communities in Africa. Vic has also worked as medic for the BBC.

We have been extremely fortunate to have these two visiting practitioners as this supports our regular Emergency Medical Technicians (Robyn Vinten, Aranee Corcoran and Teri Gibson). It brings new learnings to the practice and gives Dr Kate some much needed respite from carrying the majority of the after-hours/on call shift work.

We also have 2 regular locum nurses visiting in June. Juliana Williams 5th - 12th June and Diane Morreel 26th June.

Finding a regular staff member who is your preferred "go to", someone you gel with, ensures continuity of care which we still regard as an important model as opposed to seeing someone different every time you come to the clinic.

Below is some important information about the service the clinic is providing. There may be many questions out there and we hope this answers some of them. Please do not hesitate to ask if you still have some questions.

What is an ECP?

An ECP specialises in assessing patients with low acuity conditions and providing treatment for common minor illnesses and injuries at home, referring back to the patient's GP wherever appropriate.

What is an ICP?

An ICP is a Paramedic who has completed postgraduate qualifications in critical care. ICPs are specialists in critical care, administering advanced treatments to critically unwell and injured patients and providing clinical backup to ambulance personnel at lower practice levels.

Why am I seeing 2 people when I come for my appointment?

Our senior staff have a responsibility to oversee and train all of the other clinical staff in the practice so we must ensure that they get time to do this. It is also essential that the other staff get plenty of hands on experience so the service we provide continues to expand and Improve. Therefore, clinical tasks which can be carried out by other staff means that the senior staff can focus on more complex issues in the time available. Also, we have a duty of care to make sure we record your baseline medical data when you come for an appointment.

Why am I not seeing a GP?

As quoted from General Practice Owners Association Aotearoa New Zealand: "General Practice services are stretched and under threat, and people are waiting longer to see their family doctor as a result of workforce issues and underfunding". Colville has faced this issue for many years plus has the added complication of needing staff to take on the additional workload of the emergency and out of hours work. We no longer have a GP available in the clinic regular basis so the St John pilot is the answer to being able to provide our community with a service which we deem essential. Each time you visit a senior clinician who is not a GP, the records and notes of that appoint-ment are reviewed by a GP and if needed, guidance is given if any follow up/further action is needed. All work is reviewed and signed off by a GP.

Why can't I see Dr Kate?

Like all of us, Dr Kate also has other commitments in her life which also need her time and attention. However, when she is in the clinic, Dr Kate's main focus at the moment is to support and train new staff at the clinic which in turn ensures we can provide the best service possible to our community.

***FIREWOOD ***

We are always in search of firewood at the clinic and we are also aware that some people want to help but do not have the ability

Upper Coromandel Land Care Association June conservation report

CAGED KINGFISH IN HAURAKI GULF

Conservationists who care about our Tikapa Moana are not surprised that the industry of caged kingfish 'farming' in the will sea government approved – a business that will happen 13 km off the coast in Coromandel harbour, in our already polluted and warming Hauraki Gulf. The news will be released this month by the three taxpayer funded commissioners. We are nevertheless buoyed by collaborations. UCLA has included at least one member of Forest and Bird but there has been ongoing concern regarding methods of killing wild animals, otherwise referred to in kiwi parlance as 'pest control'. How one values wild animals is the result of education and experience and is deeply personal but choosing to be humane with our possible choices of poisons has unfortunately created fundamental discord.

However, on the topic of saving our seas we are united. UCLA had the pleasure of working alongside Waiheke environmentalists, *Protect Our Gulf* and also *Forest and Bird*'s Elvisa van der Leden now resident in Whenuakite.

We also shared commonalities with EDS, an organisation we have definitely shared opposite sides of the aisle with regard to the layering of acronyms over land use in the District Plan.

There are real challenges to raising public awareness around this polluting industry where promoters advertise jobs as a panacea. UCLA supports sustainable earth and sea-friendly job creation but dispute the idea that caged kingfish farming is healthy for our moana or our bodies.

A fantastic 'Pestival' event at Driving Creek Railway



On the 6th of May, Driving Creek Railway's conservation team with the help of Moehau Environment Group hosted DCR's latest 'Pestival'. Kiwi practitioner Diane Prince presented on kiwi.

"Kiwi prolific breeders are producing four eggs every year in clutches of two. Half of those eggs will hatch, and out of those that hatch only 5% will ever get to become an adult. It takes one pair of kiwi twenty years to replace themselves due to habitat loss and predators. The number one threat to kiwi is stoats. Even though the stoat is quite a small mustelid, they will kill a small kiwi chick and are known for not eating the kiwi but tucking the dead kiwi away. The second greatest threat to kiwi is dogs and not just a big dog but even the little dogs. A kiwi doesn't have a lot of defence mechanisms and can be easily crushed".

The remarkable generosity of Mr. Huo-Sheng Lin and Mrs. Feng-Lan Liu Lin, who funded a First Response Unit (FRU), has deeply touched the hearts of many, particularly the close-knit Colville community in the picturesque Coromandel Peninsula.

Mr. and Mrs. Lin have been running a health and souvenir business in Auckland for nearly thirty years, leading busy lives that revolve around their work.

However, amidst their bustling schedule, Mr. Lin has found solace and joy in cultivating Bonsai trees, a hobby he began in his home country of Taiwan before immigrating to New Zealand in the early 1990s.

The family was overwhelmed by the gesture of gratitude they received from the pupils of Colville School in the form of a heartwarming thank you poster. Callan McMillan, accompanied by his father James McMillan, an EMT officer, travelled from Colville to Auckland to meet the Lin family and present the poster on behalf of the school.
