

Matariki is the Māori name for a group of stars that are also known as the Pleiades star cluster.

The physical of appearance Matariki in the sky was traditionally used by a tohunga (a priest or expert) as a forecast of the year ahead. Clear and bright stars signalled warm and productive seasons, and hazy or shimmering clusters meant a cold winter was coming. This knowledge was used as a guide for seasonal activities such as planting and harvesting, the flowering of plants, the spawning of fish, and the natural cycles of the environment.

A few ways to celebrate Matariki...

> Get up early and head outside to view Matariki before sunrise.

> Take time to remember loved ones who are no longer with us. Some call out the names of the dead to honour them. You might like to sit around a fire sharing memories of the people who are no longer here.

> Learn a karakia that relates to Matariki.

- > Give thanks for the past year.
- Share your thoughts, words, and karakia to the stars.

 > Learn about the maramataka (Māori Calendar) and the phases of the moon.
 > Take some time in solitude to contemplate the world.

- > Celebrate and have a Matariki feast.
- > Create some goals for the year ahead.
- > Plan and plant a garden.

> Spend time with whānau and friends.

> Celebrate however feels right for you.

Window strike in birds

On the 18th of June, Annemieke Kregting, founder of Kuaotunu Bird Rescue (now called Coromandel Native Birds), presented on bird first aid and window strike as part of MEG's Winter Lecture Series. Annemieke suggests to help prevent birds from flying into your windows, check the window to see what the problem could be, especially if it's a window that's often struck by birds. She says "sometimes it can be caused by reflections or birds thinking there is an open area to fly through i.e. two windows opposite each other and both looking out into the garden, trees or sky. Decals are an excellent way to deter birds. They're virtually invisible to the human eye but very visible to birds. They need to be quite close together in order to be effective. It also helps to have more than one preventative measure e.g. keep curtains or blinds partially drawn".

Our next winter speaker is Paul Johnson, MEG's Operations Manager, presenting on the 9th of July at the Pepper Tree Restaurant in Coromandel on "What does MEG do?". Here's a chance to hear about our native bird monitoring including matuku/bittern and miromiro/tomtit and kiwi. Come and learn the full extent of the predator control activities that MEG is doing in the northern Coromandel peninsula.

Children sight rare matuku

It was a novel and enjoyable experience travelling to the wild wetland of Waikawau with two different groups of children from

Coromandel Area School. The 'boys' group actually got to see the rare matuku/ Australasian bittern. Matuku are not just rare. they




are classified 'Threatened-Nationally Critical'. It is estimated that there are less than 1000 individuals of these birds left. Compare this population number to that of kiwi which is 68,000 birds. It is imperative that we do everything we can to save matuku, so that our tamariki of the future have a chance its distinguished to hear wooming boom. Have a great month everyone! Ngā mihi nui!
