What is the Colville Community Health Trust, and what is our role?

We are aware there is some confusion in the community regarding the relationship between the Colville Community Health Trust (the Trust/CCHT) and the Colville Community Health Centre (the clinic) and the role of the Trust.

The Health Trust was set up in 2008 to make local health care possible in a small community. The population was not high enough to support a financially viable clinic, but with Trust and community assistance we've been able to ensure the clinic, over the past 20 years, has been able to provide high quality medical care in our community.

What the Trust does

→We contribute to costs of the Health Centre - rent, power, phone/internet, repair and maintenance - reducing expenses to ensure the community gets quality health services for the lowest possible cost. These health services include the clinic, acupuncturist,

naturopathist, counsellor and Contact Care specialist.

→We rent a property to provide housing for medical students and visiting practitioners.

→We obtain funding and liaise with donors to acquire medical /clinical equipment for the service providers. All items remain in community ownership, ensuring a smooth transition between clinicians and during times of structural change. →We participate in The Colville Project, raising money through fundraisers for the new Wellbeing and Education Centre, which will house the health services in the near future, and we have trustees in TCP governance roles.

While we rely heavily on our funders' continued support, we are also reliant on all members of our community. As highlighted in the clinic update in this issue of the Pānui, the clinic is going through a period of change, as are many health care providers in New Zealand. If as a community we want a viable local health service to continue, we do need the support of our whole community to make this happen.

- →Providing our immunity-supporting Manuka Honey Kumarahou tonics to help keep our community well.
 - →Working on communication pathways to ensure people are connected and informed.
- →Exploring possible housing options for community members who become ill and need accommodation close to medical assistance.

- →Donate funds to help with accommodation and other costs for our ill community members.

The road ahead...

The Colville Project Trustees confirm that our focus is now on development of the Wellbeing and Education Centre, (stage one of our 4 stage plan), as requested at our last round of community meetings.

Our first steps towards the development of Wellbeing and Education Centre are:



- >> weeding of the site access routes;
- >> carrying out mapping of the current infrastructure for the site;
- » a focus on funding.

We will also be working to ensure our actions align with Te Tiriti o Waitangi, including deepening our understanding of the culturally significant sites on the property.

Board update

In 2021, the Board completed a review of our 'trustees' skills. This enabled us to identify areas for Board development. In 2022, we will be seeking additional Board members with appropriate skills that complement those of our current trustees.

Be part of the journey!

In addition to this we will be establishing advisory groups. We will be seeking people with specific skill-sets to support the development of the Wellbeing and Education Centre. We are currently prioritising these groups, and further

information will be available shortly.

2022 will also see the completion of a review of a wide range of options for provision of housing for our community.

We also launched a small range of merchandise including, bags, pens, T-shirts and stickers, which are available at Colville Junction or by emailing us.

Where are we at with Covid on the other side of the World?

Well, let me give you my French version!

The last time I left France, life was... as normal as it can be! After more than 2 years of Pandemic, daily life has changed a bit.

First, masks were mandatory (it has changed since February 2022) not only inside in public places, but also outside. I must say that in the town where my parents live, not everyone was following the rule. A physical advantage of the mask though, is the protection from the cold, cause, yes, it can be freezing out here!

The favourite French way of expressing their anger, manifestation, is still rather present, with people on the street each weekend. With the necessity to hold a "Vaccin pass" to access cafés, restaurants, cinemas, etc, a black market of fake passes has emerged. A young person I talked to, paid 300€ online to get one, super easy, they said. And It's been working apparently without trouble for the past 3 months. The Health Ministry announced recently though, that 300.000 fake passes have been spotted and should be deactivated in the next week.

Second, and most disturbing, a lot of French people don't do "la bise" (kiss on each cheek) anymore. You're either welcomed with a "Salut" or ...a fist bump. Check out **Paul Taylor's video** "La bise" on Youtube to understand why many French are pleased not to kiss as much.

Third, yes, obviously, Covid is topic number 1, everywhere, everytime.

In January, we had an average of about 300 000 daily new cases (for 67,8 millions inhabitants); in February, it seems to be slowing down. Our Health minister also declared that France should stop using this pass by July or before (unless things change again).

People seem to think that the worst is behind them, often mentioning the many lockdowns with curfews and severe restrictions, as a really sombre period. Yet, people are still on guard, always expecting another "wave" to come!

Last minute update: topic number one on TV is unfotunately now the war in Ukraine...

Many readers will have received our patient letter in January. In follow up, we are writing to clarify further the points made previously, as some feedback to us suggests people are not sure what is happening.

The Colville Community Health Centre (the Clinic) is going through a period of change, which is also impacted by the nationwide transformation of the health sector over the next six months. In this time of change we want to reassure our patients and the wider community that we will do our best to have as little disruption as possible to health services.

It is extremely difficult to find clinical staff who want to work in our remote area. Most are not willing to engage in the after-hours call components of the work and finding suitable long term accommodation is a challenge. Our current staffs' capacity remains a major concern. As well as their day jobs, all clinical staff take turns at being on call for emergency and after hour call outs. This adds hugely to the load on these staff members, so the more staff we have the better it is for the team.

We have been very lucky to have had the dedicated service of Dr Kate Armstrong over the last 20 years. Dr Kate is a General Practitioner who has a passion for and a growing interest in holistic care and practices Integrated Medicine. She is growing her complementary medicine practice and now faces the challenge of having the capacity to serve the local community as well. Dr Kate's years of tireless service is now taking its toll and she is making changes that will benefit her, whilst she continues to strongly support the local health service. As a result, she will be available directly appointments but instead via her clinic staff as required and will do some on call after hours shifts.

The Clinic has experienced Practice Nurses and various locum clinicians, including Nurse Practitioners when available. We also have a Primary Care Health Assistant who supports the clinicians. For several years now Dr Kate has been investing in the training of students, by offering them experience in an isolated rural practice. She will continue to be available to advise on clinical issues to all staff and students.

development is the Clinic participating in a pilot study in conjunction with St John, Waikato DHB and Hauraki PHO, The aim is to trial a new model of remote rural General Practice, which will enable small communities like Colville to access enough clinicians to work in their area, especially at peak times. We are currently trialling a locum Extended Care Paramedic (ECP) as an addition to our usual team. The ECP is a Paramedic who has completed post graduate qualifications in a Primary Care environment and has knowledge and expertise to treat a range of health conditions. They are also able to suture and prescribe antibiotics. Our ECP is a welcome addition to the team at this time.

Proceeding with our staff, we are responding to the growing demand and our reduced staffing capacity with the hope that a Colville based health service will be maintained. We continue to seek a suitable long-term locum GP and/or Nurse Practitioner to employ as soon as we can.

We understand this is an unsettling time for many, especially those who have been with Dr Kate for many years. We reiterate Dr Kate is not leaving the practice. By making these changes the Clinic team are trying to ensure the continued existence of a local service that allows for increased capacity in a unique and innovative way.

Flocking season for Pāteke

Until relatively recently, Pāteke have been considered seriously endangered due

to significant loss of habitat and predation. Since a population of Pāteke were released into various areas around New Zealand including one at Port Charles in the northern

Coromandel 20 years ago, the local Pāteke population has gone from

strength to strength with increases in bird numbers seen since their release there in 2002. Local Pāteke have benefited from the significant predator control efforts aimed at increasing kiwi populations in the rohe, as they have been described as preferring to spend time dwelling on the ground despite their ability to fly.

At this time of year, Pāteke are more visible as it is flocking time for these delightful native birds also known as brown teal. During flocking time, large numbers of Pāteke can be found congregating at permanent water bodies including estuaries, wetlands, stream edges or river mouths.

There are many flocking sites in the rohe, including at the mouth of the Tangiaro, and sites near the Waimau Rd bridge where a significant number of Pāteke

can be observed, particularly at high tide.

The war on weeds

Did you know there are over 25,000 introduced plant species in New Zealand? Of these, hundreds are considered to be

actively harming our native ecosystems either by smothering native plants, providing hiding places for pests, or physically changing the landscape where they take hold.*

It is reported that the weediest places are often close to towns as many weeds are considered 'garden escapees' that were once planted in gardens.

You can do your bit to help the war on weeds and give our ecosystems a helping hand.

Make sure you get expert help when it comes to identifying a specific weed, and the best course of action to permanently rid the area of it.

Removing one weed can create the perfect environment for a new weed to grow so a proper plan is always best.

Use resources such as www.weedbusters.org.nz for excellent information on controlling and correct disposal of weed plants.

And consider joining a conservation group such as MEG who run regular weeding events in the local community throughout the year.
